

depend on them for food, shelter and the insects needed to feed their babies. Without the high protein found in insects many broods of bird families would not survive. Our "Native" insects, which are a food source for birds, have co-evolved with our Native plants. Those same insects are not able to eat from "alien" (non-native) plants, which may be the reason for the lack of or decrease of some varieties of birds that we would love to have still coming to our properties.

As a follow-up to this discussion, **Lynn** thought you'd be interested in a book she's reading about the importance of utilizing native plants in our landscapes, "The Living Landscape" written by Rick Darke and Doug Tallamy. This book offers the added bonus of garden ideas that are not only eco-sensitive but beautiful as well.

This meeting was open to the public and **Deanna** took the opportunity to present a brief overview of our club's mission and the important

contributions we make to the community. Presentations like this enhance our public profile and may also attract new members. Another highlight of the meeting was the presentation of the Vermont Garden Club's Golden Trowel award to **Karen Vatne** in recognition of the many ways she contributes to our success. Most of the photos in this newsletter being just one example of her talents. Thanks Karen for everything you do. The finishing touch on this event was the gorgeous table of food made possible by SGC members' fabulous culinary skills. Thanks to everyone who contributed to this meeting's success.
